On November 6, America will be given the opportunity to exercise the act of voting in the Midterm Elections. This will constitute as a state election, and fall in the middle of President Trump's first term. The positions State Governor, Senate, and House of Representatives will be contested in this primary election.

Here's what you need to know because of your Michigan residency:

Republican Governor Rick Snyder is retiring, leaving his position open for a new governor. Former Michigan Senator, Gretchen Whitmer, is running for governor as a Democratic Candidate. Whitmer's platform includes fixing Michigan roads and making health care more affordable. Running against Whitmer is Republican Attorney General Bill Schuette, whose platform focuses on cutting taxes and raising families' pay. Not only will this election in November determine Michigan's 49th Governor, it will also cover Congress. Debbie Stabenow (D), John James (R), and Sandy Pensler (R) are in the race for the Senate. For Michigan's House of Representatives, there are 14 Congressional Districts- Hillsdale falls into the seventh. The race for MI's House of Representatives covers: incumbent Republican Tim Walberg and Democrat Gretchen Driskell. The ballot will also propose bills such as: the law to authorize and legalize possession of marijuana on the basis of use and cultivation (for those 21 years and older), an amendment to halt the political tactic of gerrymandering, and one relating to absentee ballots.

Yes, all of these names and D's and R's are confusing, but the importance of voting is clear--voting is our civic duty as Americans. A majority of our school is not the legal age to vote yet, but that does not mean it is too early to educate yourself on elections, candidates, and their platforms. If you are 18 and not registered to vote yet, see Mrs. Cornett for an easy to fill out voter registration form at no cost to exercise this civil liberty. Hope to see you at the polls this November!
