THE UNDECLARED RATIONALE AGAINST BACKPACKS, AUTHORITY LACKS AFFIRMATION

As the 2018-2019 school year approaches its one month mark, students question section one subsection fifteen of the Hillsdale High School Handbook, commonly known as the “no backpack rule”. Students are required to stow bags in their lockers during the school day and class time, but are left with no explanation as to why.

In section one page 16 under “BOOK BAGS AND BACKPACKS”, the author roughly states, “Book bags and backpacks are to be kept in lockers during the school day and will not be allowed in class”, but does not expand on reasoning for the rule. Although this regulation is one of the more emphasized ones throughout the school, the handbook lacks adequate explanation as to why not. Code of Conduct- Dress and Grooming provides a greater extensive explanation of the detrimental impact of, “...fashion that disrupts the educational process...”, by pronouncing, “While fashions change, the reason for being in school does not. Students are in school to learn”. It continues to enforce a process recommended for students “when dressing for school” and a prolonged list of prohibited clothing items. The terrible dangers of dress code are expanded over more than a page, while the heavily enforced policy against backpacks is undermined.

Due to the understated reasoning against book bags and backpacks, the newspaper publication staff voted that Hillsdale High School students should be allowed to carry bags (19-yes, no-0). Senior Ryan Wood explains, “If backpacks are to be banned in the classroom, we should be given a longer intermission in between class periods,” noting that the tasks of using the restroom and walking to a locker are unattainable in the allotted time.

Why does the authority at Hillsdale High School enforce rules against backpacks if its explanation is undermined, especially in comparison to the over explained dress code?
